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EPR IN ONTARIO











- Province sets the outcomes as opposed to producers
 - Performance requirements and timelines established in regulation
 - No plan requirement
 - Producers individually liable to meet outcomes

Oversight

- Direct access to compliance data as opposed to through producer responsibility organization (PRO)
- Independent compliance organization resourced through fees
- Plan approval cannot be used as defense for not meeting targets

Competition

- Allows for multiple PROs to give producers choice
- Competition Act explicitly applies to all activities
- Plan approval cannot be used as a regulatory conduct defence

LESSONS LEARNED

- PRO competition has been embraced
 - o 6 Tire PROs, 12 EEE PROs, 3 Battery PROs, 9 HSP PROs, 3 PPP PROs
 - Would expect similar in other jurisdictions regardless of size
- Intense lobbying has created major issues
 - Multiple regulations passed just months before producer obligations came into force (e.g., not enough time for producers to register, free riders to be found, commercial arrangements to be established ...)
 - Reductions in targets and broader exemptions
 - Constant assault on RPRA (oversight organization)
- EPR not meant to solve every problem
 - New requirements (e.g., credits against targets for recycled content) make regulations more difficult to enforce

LESSONS LEARNED

PPP Regulation

- Common collection system for PPP creates unique challenge as it is more akin to a utility
- Allocation table and rule-making as mechanism to support common collection system in the Blue Box Regulation have resulted in power struggle between producer-governed PRO and waste-management owned PRO, delays in preparing for transition, stakeholder confusion, and Ministerial intervention
- Regulation did not effectively reconcile requirement for common collection system with legislative framework for competing PROs

Regulator

Should publish more timely information on producer performance and compliance efforts
