



Food Waste

- Backyard Compostable
 - fruits, vegetables
- Backyard Non-compostable
 - Meat, bones, breads, non-liquid dairy, fats, food soiled paper



Yard & Garden Waste

- Small yard waste
 - Leaves, branches, grass clippings







Prior to January 2022

 6 cans garbage & bagged yard waste weekly

From January 4, 2022

- Weekly food waste collection
- Seasonal (ninemonth) yard waste collection
- Bi-weekly curbside recycling collection
- Bi-weekly garbage collection (3-can limit)







Town of Creston

- 5,500 population
- 2,600 homes
- Extensive engagement & consultation in 18 months prior





Prior to June 2022

 2 cans garbage weekly

From June 2022

- Weekly food waste collection
- Bi-weekly curbside recycling collection
- Bi-weekly garbage collection (1 x 120L-can limit)



YOUR PARTICIPATION IS MAKING A DIFFERENCE!

2022 Curbside Collection Program Results (6 month period from July to Dec)

Garbage (Mixed Waste) Collected(241.9T) **53.6%**

Organic Food Waste Collected (133.21) 29.5% Recyclable Material Collected (75.81) 16.8%

Total Material Diverted from landfill 46.3% (209T)

In 2022, landfill cost savings resulting from curbside organic and recycling division options was \$14,999.

Creston's Diversion Goal is 60%. Let's keep working towards additional savings!



Lessons (it's a long list)

- Organics diversion is NOT an EPR program
 - So that means....what exactly?
- Create a Plan of Attack
 - How do you eat an elephant?
 One bite at a time!
- Know what you don't know
 - Then go find out the answers







Lessons Learned (cont'd)


- Be realistic about capacity and resources
 - How many hats are being worn?
 - It probably isn't a side-ofthe-desk project
- Find champions and allies
 - They are awesome
- Pilot projects (CBSM model)
 - If you can swing it, they can be very worthwhile








We want to avoid this!




